Women managers do better

Companies with at least 30% of women board members get 15% more benefits.

[Peterson Institute for International Economics](#) does research on gender issues and their impact on companies. In [this study](#), carried across 21.980 companies all over 91 countries, they highlight some significant points, such as:



- **less than 5 percent** of those companies have a female chief executive officer (CEO);
- **nearly 60 percent** of the studied firms have no female board members;
- the financial, healthcare, telecommunications and utilities sectors exhibit **the largest shares** of female executive and board representation;
- basic materials, technology, energy, and industrials exhibit **the least amount** of female managers;
- **Companies with at least 30% of women board members get 15% more benefits.**

In short, it's good to be aware of this when creating your team.

Enough is enough

Read the sentences 1. and 2. and relate them to the explanation a. or b.

1. *We haven't got fresh enough drinks.*
 2. *We haven't got enough fresh drinks.*
- a. *We have some fresh drinks but we need more.*
b. *None of the drinks are as fresh as we need.*

Solution: When enough comes before the noun (fresh enough drinks) it qualifies the adjective. When enough comes before the adjective it qualifies the noun phrase. Thus, 1.b. and 2.a
